From Struggle to Victory: A Study on Romans 7 & 8

Introduction

Many believers find themselves in the tension of Romans 7—wanting to live righteously but feeling trapped in sin and self-defeat. However, Romans 8 offers the pathway to victory, freedom, and life in the Spirit. This study will explore **how to transition from struggle to victory** by shifting from self-reliance to Spirit-dependence.

I. Recognizing the Struggle (Romans 7:14-24)

A. The Reality of the Flesh (v. 14-17)

"For we know that the law is spiritual, but I am of the flesh, sold under sin." (v. 14)

- Paul describes the battle between knowing what is right and being unable to do it.
- The law reveals sin, but it does not give power to overcome it.

B. The Powerlessness of Self (v. 18-20)

"For I have the desire to do what is right, but not the ability to carry it out." (v. 18)

- Good intentions are not enough—human effort fails.
- The sin nature wars against the desire to do right.

C. The Cry of Desperation (v. 21-24)

"O wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death?" (v. 24)

- Paul reaches a **breaking point**, recognizing that he cannot free himself.
- This **cry for help** is the turning point toward victory.

- 1. In what ways do you relate to Paul's struggle in Romans 7?
- 2. Why do human effort and willpower fail in overcoming sin?
- 3. What are some areas in your life where you feel stuck in this cycle?

II. The Transition from Defeat to Victory (Romans 7:25 – 8:4)

A. The Answer is in Christ (7:25)

"Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

- Victory **begins with gratitude**—recognizing that Jesus is the way out.
- The shift from self-reliance to Christ-reliance is key.

B. No Condemnation in Christ (8:1)

"There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus."

- Condemnation keeps us trapped in guilt and failure.
- The believer is **fully justified**, meaning the struggle does not define them.

C. The Law of the Spirit Sets Us Free (8:2-4)

"For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death."

- The **Holy Spirit empowers** believers to overcome sin.
- The difference between law vs. Spirit: The law commands, but the Spirit enables.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. What does it mean that there is "no condemnation" in Christ?
- 2. Why is it important to shift from self-reliance to Christ-reliance?
- 3. How does the Holy Spirit set us free from the law of sin and death?

III. Living in the Power of the Spirit (Romans 8:5-17)

A. Setting the Mind on the Spirit (v. 5-8)

"For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh."

- Victory starts in the **mind**—our thoughts determine our direction.
- Walking in the Spirit means focusing on God's truth, not the flesh.

B. The Indwelling Power of the Spirit (v. 9-11)

"The Spirit of God dwells in you."

- The same power that raised Jesus from the dead lives in us.
- The Spirit gives life and strength beyond our ability.

C. Putting Sin to Death (v. 12-13)

"If by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live."

- Sin must be actively resisted, but only by the power of the Spirit.
- Victory is not just avoiding sin but pursuing life in the Spirit.

D. The Spirit of Adoption (v. 14-17)

"You have received the Spirit of adoption, by whom we cry, 'Abba! Father!'"

- We are not slaves to sin, but children of God.
- A child **doesn't strive to earn love**—he rests in his identity.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. What does it mean to "set your mind on the Spirit"?
- 2. How does the Holy Spirit empower us to put sin to death?
- 3. What changes when you truly see yourself as God's child instead of a slave to sin?

IV. The Assurance of Ultimate Victory (Romans 8:18-39)

A. Hope in the Midst of Suffering (v. 18-25)

"The sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed."

- Struggles are temporary, but God's glory is eternal.
- Hope **keeps us moving forward** even when we fail.

B. Help in Weakness Through Prayer (v. 26-27)

"The Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words."

• The Holy Spirit **prays for us**, even when we don't know what to pray.

C. Confidence in God's Purpose (v. 28-30)

"All things work together for good for those who love God."

• Even our struggles serve **God's greater purpose** in making us more like Christ.

D. The Unshakable Love of Christ (v. 31-39)

"Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus."

- Victory is not just about overcoming sin—it's about resting in God's love.
- We don't fight for victory; we fight from victory.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. How does focusing on eternity change how we handle struggles today?
- 2. How does the Holy Spirit help us when we feel weak in our faith?
- 3. What does it mean to live with the confidence that nothing can separate you from God's love?

Conclusion: The Key to Victory

- Moving from **Romans 7 to Romans 8** requires a **shift in dependence**:
 - From self-effort to Spirit-led living.

- o From condemnation to confidence in Christ.
- o From struggling alone to surrendering to the Holy Spirit.

 - Daily surrender Acknowledge your need for the Holy Spirit's power.
 - o Renew your mind Set your thoughts on the Spirit (Romans 8:5).

 - Walk in identity Live as a child of God, not as a slave to sin.
